PART 1 – From Simple to Compound and Complex Sentences

1.1 Core Sentence Structure

Every English sentence needs a **subject** and a **verb**.

But at university level, we don't stop at simple S-V-O patterns. We combine clauses to make richer meanings.

Element	Description	Example
Independent clause	Can stand alone as a sentence	I am from Türkiye.
Dependent clause	Cannot stand alone; adds information	because I love languages.
Phrase	Group of words without full subject + verb	In Mersin

1.3 Why This Matters for Translators

- **Simple sentences** = clarity but can sound childlike if overused.
- **Compound/complex sentences** = richer, more academic style.
- **Run-on sentences** = errors that confuse readers.

Japan	Japanese	She's Japanese but lives in Mersin.
Mexico	Mexican	He's Mexican although he travels often.

4.1 Coordinating Conjunctions (Compound Sentences)

Conjunction	Meaning	Example
for	because	I stayed home, for it was raining.
and	in addition	I'm Turkish, and I study English.
nor	not either	He doesn't eat meat, nor does he drink milk.
but	contrast	She's from England, but she lives in Türkiye.
or	choice	You can study now, or you can study later.
yet	still/contrast	It's small, yet it's beautiful.
so	result	I was tired, so I went to bed early.

4.2 Subordinating Conjunctions (Complex Sentences)

Subordinator	Example
because	I study translation because I enjoy languages.
although / even though	Although it's raining, I'm going out.
when / while	I listen to music while I work.
since	Since I arrived, I've been busy.
if / unless	If it rains, we'll stay inside.

PART 5 – Mechanics: Capitalization, Punctuation, and Run-On Sentences

5.1 Capitalization Rules

Capitalize	Example
First word of every sentence	My name is Ayşe.
The pronoun "I"	I am a student.
Names, nationalities, languages	He speaks Turkish and English.
Titles, proper nouns	Professor Smith teaches Translation.

5.2 Punctuation Rules for Compound and Complex Sentences

Construction	Rule	Example
Compound with coordinating	Use a comma before the	I'm from Türkiye, and I live in
conjunction	conjunction	Mersin.
Complex with subordinator at the	Use a comma after the	Because I love languages, I study
beginning	dependent clause	translation.
Complex with subordinator at the	No comma before the	I study translation because I love
end	subordinator	languages.

5.3 Run-On Sentences Explained

A run-on sentence occurs when two or more independent clauses are joined without proper punctuation or connectors.

Type	Incorrect Example	Corrected Example
Fused	I'm from Turkey I study	I'm from Turkey. I study translation.
sentence	translation.	
Comma	I'm from Turkey, I study	I'm from Turkey, and I study translation. or I'm from
splice	translation.	Turkey; I study translation.

How to Fix a Run-On Sentence:

- 1. Add a period: I'm from Turkey. I study translation.
- 2. Use a coordinating conjunction with a comma: I'm from Turkey, and I study translation.
- 3. Use a semicolon: I'm from Turkey; I study translation.
