Why Does a Good Prompt Matter?

Bad vs. Good Prompts



Prompt 1

"Tell me about a trip."


Prompt 2

"Describe a memorable trip you have taken. Where did you go? Who were you with? What activities did you do? What made it special? Write at least 5-6 sentences. Use the past tense in your writing."

Think-Pair-Share:

Think about the AI tools you have used.

What are the <u>key elements</u> of a good prompt?



What Makes a Good Prompt?

Clear and Concise Language

Use clear language to ensure the prompts are easy to understand and follow.

Context and Background

Include any necessary context or background information to help the AI generate accurate and relevant responses.

Specific Instruction

Give detailed instructions or guidelines on what you expect the AI to deliver.

Sample Prompts

Vocabulary Practice

Less Effective Prompt: "Give me some vocabulary related to food."

This prompt is <u>too vague</u>. It's unclear and lacks direction.

Good Prompt: "Can you give me 5 nouns related to fruits (e.g., apple, banana) and use them in simple sentences?

It is concise and well-structured.

Grammar Practice

Less Effective Prompt: "Explain past tense."

This prompt is <u>too broad</u>. It is ambiguous.

Good Prompt: "Can you explain how to use the past simple tense with regular verbs and give me 3 example sentences in A2 level?"

It is detailed and task-oriented.

Reading Comprehension

Less Effective Prompt: "Give me a story about animals."

Good Prompt: "Can you give me a short story about a dog and ask 2 questions about it?"

This prompt is <u>too vague</u>. AI needs more parameters.

It is targeted and purposeful.

Speaking Practice

Less Effective Prompt: "Let's talk about travel."

This prompt is <u>too open-ended</u>. It lacks focus and direction.

Good Prompt: "Can we practice a conversation at a restaurant? You'll be the waiter, and I'll order food."

It is interactive and actionable.

Writing Practice (Feedback)

Less Effective Prompt: "Check my writing."

Too vague.

Good Prompt: "Here's a short paragraph I wrote about my weekend in A2 level. Can you check it for grammar mistakes and suggest ways I can improve it?"

It is a specific task.

Cultural Understanding

Less Effective Prompt: "Tell me about holidays in the USA."

Too broad.

Good Prompt: "Choose one major holiday celebrated in the USA, such as Thanksgiving or Independence Day. Describe when it is celebrated, what traditions people follow, and why it is important to Americans."

It is specific and clear.

Prompt Writing: Three Steps

1.Test initial Prompt

• Begin with a basic prompt


2.Evaluate Output

- Assess the AI's response.
- Identify gaps and weaknesses

3. Refine Prompt

- Add examples and roles
- Specify desired output format





Prompt Models

PARTS Model

Google's model focuses on persona, aim, recipients, theme, and structure. Link

TATTOO Model

Brent Warner's model emphasizes task, actor, target, translation, objective, output. Link

5 "S" Model

AI for Education's model sets the scene, is specific, simplifies, structures, and shares feedback. Link

Persona: Identify your role

Aim: State your objectives

Recipients: Specify the audience

Theme: Describe the style, tone, any task parameters

Structure: Note the desired format of the output.

Mike:


That sounds amazing! I've never been to Italy, but it's definitely on my list. Have you had any challenges on your trips?

Anna:


Well, I've had a few! I've gotten lost a couple of times, but I've learned to use Google Maps better. What about you, Mike? Any challenges during your trip to Paris?

Ethical Issues and Bias with AI



Challenges and Solutions:

- **1. Data Privacy** Al tools collect user information. It is important to follow rules to keep this data safe.
- **2. Avoiding Bias in Al** Sometimes, Al gives unfair results about gender, race, or other topics. You should check Al answers and make sure they are fair.
- **3. Unknown Data Sources** Al uses information from the internet, but we do not always know where it comes from.

LingQ – Uses AI to help learners read and listen to authentic materials.

YouGlish – Uses YouTube videos to show real-world pronunciation examples.

ChatGPT (Free version) – Can be used as a conversation partner or tutor.
